





About the venue: AIIMS Kalyani

All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) Kalyani was officially approved, under the Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suraksha Yojana (PMSSY), by the Union Cabinet on October 07, 2015. The Institute was approved to be established over a span of 179.82 acres of land on National Highway – 34, around 50 km from Kolkata, in the village of Basantapur, near Kalyani, District Nadia, West Bengal.

AIIMS Kalyani is an Institute of National Importance set up to address imbalances at three levels – regional, specialties, and the ratio of medical doctors to nurses and other healthcare professionals. It intends to develop patterns of teaching in undergraduate and postgraduate medical education in all its branches so as to demonstrate a high standard of medical education to all medical colleges and other allied institutions in India.

In phase I, AIIMS Kalyani is proposed to be a 960-bedded hospital equipped with all modern facilities. To further enhance healthcare delivery, AIIMS Kalyani lays special emphasis on Alternative Systems of Medicine, AYUSH. In subsequent phases, AIIMS Kalyani is likely to widen the spectrum of services through the expansion of various super-speciality departments. AIIMS Kalyani started its first academic session from September 04, 2019, with a batch of 50 MBBS students.

How to Reach

<u>Via Flight</u>: The nearest airport is Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose Airport, Kolkata, is well connected with other parts of the country with regular flights.

<u>Via Road</u>: AIIMS Kalyani is located at a distance of about 50 km from Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose International Airport. It is well connected through the Kalyani Expressway.

<u>Via Train</u>: The nearest railway station is Kalyani Junction(10 km) for local trains. It is well connected from Sealdah railway station, Kolkata, with trains running from Sealdah to Kalyani Junction every 15 minutes.

Effects of Health Belief Model based Educational Intervention for Breast Cancer Prevention among Women of Reproductive Age Group (WRA) in Burdwan Municipality, West Bengal

Introduction:

Cancer is one of the leading causes of death worldwide and among all cancer deaths breast cancer is one of them. World Cancer Report 2020 stated that the most efficient intervention for breast cancer control is early detection and rapid treatment. Regular breast screening is the best way to detect early breast cancer. The goal of screening for breast cancer is to identify signs of breast cancer among all women even before the symptoms appear. Unfortunately, cancer prevention programs in India do not get enough attention despite the rising burden of the disease, its high social and economic costs, and the availability of cost-effective screening methods. According to NFHS-5 the screening for breast cancer in rural and urban areas are 0.1% and 0.2% respectively.

Women of reproductive age group who are more prone to having breast cancer, should acquire knowledge about early signs of breast cancer and the different screening methods to enhance their awareness of breast cancer and help them to initiate breast self examination (BSE) at younger ages. The health belief model (HBM)-based education is one of the earliest behaviour change models to explain human health decision-making and subsequent behavior change. Educating people (with the help of HBM model) about methods for diagnosing breast cancer at an early stage will basic knowledge about mammography, CBE and skills in how to practice BSE which will help their own health and be a role model for their patients. There is paucity of study on improving preventive behaviours in the community among women of reproductive age group (WRA) in India. With the above view the present study will be conducted to determine the effects of health education based on health belief model (HBM) on breast cancer screening and knowledge about breast cancer among the women of reproductive age group in urban slums of Burdwan Municipality, West Bengal.

Methodology:

The study design was a quasi-experimental single group study with pre and post educational intervention which will be done over a period of 9 months among 435 WRA in urban slums of Burdwan Municipality, West Bengal. A pre-designed, pre-tested semi-structured schedule was used for data collection after getting ethical clearance from the concerned authority. It had 3 sections like sociodemographic profile of the study subjects, knowledge about breast cancer and questions on Health belief model domains. Scoring was done and for knowledge assessment total score (range 0-6) was calculated and those scoring more than 50% of maximum attainable score was considered to have good knowledge. Scoring for HBM constructs was done too. Participants scoring more than 50% of total score was considered to have good perception about breast cancer. Intervention in the form of health education was done using local language of the participants i.e. Bengali. It was focused on major areas of deficiencies regarding epidemiology of breast cancer, risk factors, signs, symptoms, early detection of breast cancer and the BSE technique. The duration of the session was 30 mins following which post test session which was conducted after one month and six months.

Data management and analysis:

Collected data was checked for completeness and consistency and then data was entered in Excel data sheet. Quantitative data was expressed in mean (SD). Qualitative data was expressed in proportion. Descriptive statistics was applied to organise and present the data in the form of tables and diagrams. ANOVA test was done to find out the association of breast cancer knowledge scores and HBM scores, before and after educational intervention. P value less than or equal to 0.05 was considered statistically significant. Multivariable logistic regression was done to find out the predictors for each domain of health belief model. Goodness of fit of those models were tested using Hosmer-lemeshow statistics and variability of dependent variables explained by the independent variables in the model was reported using Nagelkarke R2 value. Data was be analysed using Statistical Package for Social Science (SPSS) version 23.

Result:

Among the 435 study participants, median age was 30 years (IQR=27–35). Majority (79.8%) were Hindu by religion and 67.4% lived in nuclear families. 67.8% of the study participants belonged to general category followed by 16.1% were from schedule caste.95.4% were married, 15.0% were either separated or divorced or widow and 92.2% had < 2 children. Among the participants only 23.2% were using contraceptives. Repeated measure ANOVA was used to compare the effectiveness of intervention (health education) over time and it was found that there was a significant improvement in scores in every domain of HBM which was statistically significant (p<0.001). Again multivariable logistic regression analysis was done to find out the factors that shapes the perception about breast cancer. It was found that as the age increases, >30 years, odds of satisfactory perception of susceptibility score [aOR= 0.052 (0.020- 0.132)] and perceived severity score [aOR= 0.428 (0.229-0.797)] decreases but when the age decreases < 30 years cues to action [aOR= 4.731 (1.296-17.270)] and perceived benefit scores [aOR=10.745(1.387-83.245)] significantly increases. Significant factors associated with satisfactory perception of susceptibility was nuclear family [aOR=3.099 (1.208-7.949)]. Participants living in a nuclear family had 2.5 times higher chances of having unsatisfactory perceived barriers score as compared to the participants living in joint family [aOR= 2.626 (1.450-4.755)]. Statistically significant self efficacy satisfactory score was 2.6 times higher among the participant whose family income > Rs.7000/- as compared to the other group [aOR= 2.684 (1.052-6.847)].

Conclusion:

This study had manifold implications. In this study, Health Belief Model was used to assess the perceptions regarding breast cancer among a very vulnerable population using health education intervention. The gaps identified can be addressed through tailored interventions to increase the awareness regarding breast cancer and its prevention.

Title: Effect of a Multimodal Intervention on Frailty Among Elderly in a Rural Area of Singur, West Bengal: A Quasi-Experimental Study

Background and Rationale:

Frailty is a geriatric syndrome characterized by decreased physiological reserve and increased vulnerability to adverse health outcomes like falls, hospitalization, and functional decline. It's defined by physical characteristics such as weakness, unintentional weight loss, and low physical activity. The global prevalence of frailty among community-dwelling older adults ranges from 4-59%. In India, the elderly population is projected to reach 173 million by 2026, posing a significant public health challenge. Studies in rural India report a frailty prevalence of 23.7%. Rural elderly face unique challenges, including poor living conditions, limited healthcare access, and financial constraints, making them particularly susceptible to this syndrome. Combined diet and exercise interventions have shown promise in preventing and reversing frailty. The SPRINTT trial, a European study, demonstrated a 22% reduction in mobility disability over three years using a multicomponent intervention. Recent systematic reviews and meta-analyses consistently show that combined exercise and nutrition interventions are more effective than single-component interventions. This study addresses a significant knowledge gap by adapting evidence-based frailty interventions for implementation in a resource-constrained environment like rural India. The findings will have immediate policy relevance for India's National Programme for the Health Care of the Elderly and similar initiatives in other low- and middle-income countries.

Study Objectives:

- * Develop an intervention package for frailty management and an adherence checklist for the elderly using ADDIE model.
- * Implement the intervention among the study participants.
- * Train ASHAs (Accredited Social Health Activists) to ensure adherence to the intervention's follow-up protocol.
- * Measure the effect of the intervention on frailty among participants.
- * Assess the feasibility of implementing the package for relevant stakeholders.

Methodology

The study is a community-based, quasi-experimental study with a single-group pre-test/post-test design, using an embedded mixed-methods approach. The study will be conducted in the service area of the Rural Health Unit & Training Centre, Singur, West Bengal. The study duration is 11 months. The quantitative study population consists of elderly residents aged 60 and above residing in the study setting for at least one year and screened for frailty. The sample size is 41 participants, accounting for a 20% attrition rate. The qualitative strand will involve elderly residents with frailty and ASHAs, selected using purposive sampling until data saturation is reached.

Tools & Intervention:

Frailty will be assessed using the Fried Frailty Phenotype. The change in Frailty will be assessed by the same tool. The intervention is a six-month, culturally tailored program comprising two key components:

- Model Exercise Intervention Plan
- Model Dietary Regimen

The intervention package will be delivered by the researcher, while ASHAs will handle the follow-up checklist to monitor and support adherence.

Expected Outcomes and Implications:

This study will provide crucial evidence on the effectiveness and feasibility of a low-cost, community-based intervention for frailty in rural India. The results can serve as a scalable model for other resource-constrained environments in India and other low- and middle-income countries (LMICs). Effective frailty interventions may reduce healthcare costs by preventing disability and hospitalizations, offering significant economic advantages.

Title: Awareness, Utilisation and Willingness to Pay Under Swasthya Sathi Scheme in a Rural Setting of West Bengal: A Community-Based Mixed Methods Study

Background:

The Swasthya Sathi Scheme, launched in December 2016 by the Government of West Bengal, provides cashless, paperless health insurance coverage of ₹5 lakh per family. The smart card, issued in the name of the eldest woman in the family, covers all pre-existing diseases and is accepted at empanelled public and private hospitals. Despite extensive enrolment (>2.4 crore families, 95 lakh hospitalisations by May 2025), gaps in awareness, utilisation, and satisfaction persist. Willingness to Pay (WTP) for additional services—such as OPD coverage, diagnostics, and medicinal supports, which are not included under the scheme-remains under-explored in similar study settings of West Bengal.

Objectives:

- 1. To assess the level of awareness regarding the Swasthya Sathi scheme among the heads of the families/responsible adult family members in a rural community of West Bengal
- 2. To find out the utilisation pattern of health services under the scheme among the respondents
- 3. To explore the perceived barriers to the utilization of the scheme among the respondents
- 4. To estimate the Willingness to Pay (WTP) of the respondents for the inclusion of additional health services
- 5. To identify association, if any, between socio-demographic factors and the utilisation pattern of the scheme among the respondents
- 6. To find out the association, if any, between socio-demographic factors and Willingness to Pay (WTP) values for the inclusion of additional benefits among the respondents

Methods:

A community-based, cross-sectional study with a concurrent mixed-methods approach will be conducted in the Bandipur Block Primary Health Centre area (Barrackpore II Block, North 24 Parganas, West Bengal. Data will be collected from 161 families via multistage sampling using a validated, pre-designed, pre-tested, structured questionnaire on socio-demographics, awareness, utilisation, and WTP. The qualitative component will involve 10 in-depth interviews (by stratified purposive sampling) via an IDI guide with beneficiaries until data saturation. WTP exercise will be hypothetically done by the contingent valuation method (bidding game). Quantitative data will be analysed in Jamovi software version 2.6.26 using descriptive statistics, Chi-square/Fisher's exact tests, correlation, and logistic/Tobit regression. Qualitative data will undergo thematic analysis (Braun & Clarke framework).

Ethical Aspects:

The study will secure TAC and IEC approvals, obtain informed consent, clarify hypothetical WTP with no actual financial transactions, and strictly ensure confidentiality and anonymity, while adhering to ethical standards of descriptive epidemiological research throughout the study.

Expected Outcomes:

The study will provide estimates of awareness, utilisation, and barriers, and quantify WTP for additional services under the scheme. Findings will help to introduce new services under health schemes and will benefit the communities as well. It would be a way for policy refinements under the government and would enhance their investments in health in West Bengal.

Title: Evaluating the Outcomes of an HIV/AIDS Awareness Program Among School Teachers in Rural West Bengal: A Mixed-Method Quasi-Experimental Study"

Background:

Despite national declines in HIV prevalence in India, rural areas in states like West Bengal face unique vulnerabilities due to lower literacy, specific migration patterns, and limited healthcare access. School teachers are pivotal community influencers, positioned to disseminate crucial health information. This study aims to evaluate the effectiveness of a structured HIV/AIDS awareness program for school teachers in rural West Bengal, leveraging their potential as agents of change.

Objectives:

The primary objective is to assess the impact of an educational intervention on school teachers' knowledge, attitudes, and stigma-related perceptions regarding HIV/AIDS. The study also aims to explore teachers' perceptions of their role in HIV/AIDS awareness and identify barriers and facilitators to disseminating this knowledge.

Methods:

A mixed-method, single-group, pre-post quasi-experimental study will be conducted in four government secondary schools in the Budge Budge II Block. Approximately 200 teachers will participate in the quantitative arm, completing pre- and post-intervention surveys using validated HIV Knowledge and Stigma Scales. For the qualitative component, 8-12 teachers from each school will participate in Focus Group Discussions to explore their experiences and perceptions. The intervention will consist of a structured awareness module delivered over two months.

Results:

Analysis of quantitative and qualitative data is projected to demonstrate the program's impact on improving knowledge and fostering more positive attitudes and reduced stigma towards HIV/AIDS among teachers. Conclusion: This study will highlight the viability of school-based interventions to enhance HIV/AIDS awareness in rural communities. Empowering teachers with accurate information can effectively reduce stigma and build a supportive environment for HIV prevention and care.

TITLE: COMPARING DIAGNOSTIC ACCURACY OF CHATGPT AND MBBS INTERNS USING SIMULATED CLINICAL VIGNETTES: A EXPERIMENTAL STUDY FOR AI INTEGRATION IN MEDICAL EDUCATION.

Background:

Artificial Intelligence (AI), particularly large language models such as ChatGPT-4, is being increasingly incorporated into healthcare education and diagnostics. Currently, there is limited information regarding how ChatGPT's diagnostic accuracy compares with that of Indian MBBS interns when both are presented with standardized clinical scenarios and ethical dilemmas.

Objective:

To assess and compare the diagnostic performance, time efficiency, confidence, and ethical reasoning of ChatGPT-4 versus MBBS interns using validated clinical vignettes.

Methods: This comparative experimental study involved 200 MBBS interns at Calcutta National Medical College. Participants completed twenty structured clinical vignettes and ten scenarios assessing ethical or logical judgment. Data collected included diagnostic accuracy, time spent per case, confidence levels, and logical judgment scores. ChatGPT-4 was presented with the same vignettes for comparison. Statistical analyses were performed using t-tests, correlation, Cohen's Kappa, and logistic regression via SPSS 27.0.

Results:

ChatGPT-4 showed higher diagnostic accuracy (85%) and faster completion times (1.2 vs 3.25 minutes) than MBBS interns (mean accuracy = 69.85%). While ChatGPT had perfect agreement with experts (κ = 1.0), interns' agreement was minimal (κ = 0.016). Interns scored higher in ethical reasoning (13.12/20 vs 8/20), and confidence was the only significant predictor of diagnostic accuracy.

Conclusion:

ChatGPT-4 demonstrates higher diagnostic speed and accuracy compared to MBBS interns but shows limitations in ethical reasoning and contextual judgment. Incorporating AI into medical education as a diagnostic tool, rather than replacing human clinicians, represents an approach that could support the development of both cognitive and affective skills.

TITLE: QUALITY OF ANTENATAL CARE AND IMMUNIZATION SERVICES DURING VILLAGE HEALTH SANITATION AND NUTRITION DAY IN A COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK IN WEST BENGAL

Background:

Village Health Sanitation and Nutrition Day (VHSND) is a critical platform under the National Health Mission (NHM) to deliver essential maternal and child health services in rural India. However, the quality of service delivery during these sessions remains a concern. Understanding the quality care services and there indicators is crucial for targeted intervention strategies.

Objectives:

- 1) To assess the quality of antenatal care services during village health sanitation and nutrition day among pregnant females in a community development block of North 24 Parganas District, West Bengal, India.
- 2) To assess the quality of immunization services of children aged less than five years during village health sanitation and nutrition day in the study area.

Methods:

A community-based cross-sectional observational study was conducted on 64 antenatal pregnant women and 64 children aged less than five years across the ten VHSND sessions. Data were collected using structured observation checklists and beneficiary interviews. Quality indicators for ANC and immunization were assessed based on national guidelines. Descriptive statistics and inferential analyses, including chi-square and Fisher's exact tests, were used to explore associations between quality service receipt and background characteristics.

Results:

Quality ANC services were received by 42.2% of pregnant women, with highest coverage among those in the second trimester (65.0%). Key ANC procedures such as blood pressure, hemoglobin, and abdominal examinations were inconsistently performed during the first trimester. For immunization services, 45.3% of children under five received all components of quality care. While MCP/RI card updating and correct sequence of vaccination were widely followed, safe injection practices and biomedical waste management were suboptimal. A significant association was found between quality ANC and gestational age (p=0.026), and between quality immunization and age of the child (p=0.002), while other socio demographic variables showed no statistically significant association.

TITLE: ASSESSMENT OF MENSTRUAL HEALTH SCHEME AND ANWESHA CLINIC/AFHC COMPONENT OF RASHTRIYA KISHOR SWASTHYA KARYAKRAM (RKSK) IN BARRACKPORE II COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK OF NORTH 24 PARGANAS, WEST BENGAL: A CROSS-SECTIONAL STUDY"

Background:

Adolescence represents a critical developmental phase with unique health needs. The Rashtriya Kishor Swasthya Karyakram (RKSK), launched in 2014, aims to address these needs through facility-based services such as the Anwesha Clinics/Adolescent Friendly Health Clinics (AFHCs) and community-based interventions like the Menstrual Hygiene Scheme. Evaluating the implementation of these components provides insights into their effectiveness in rural West Bengal.

Objectives:

- 1. To assess the functioning of Menstrual Health Scheme component of RKSK in Barrackpore II Community Development Block.
- 2. To find out the functioning of Facility based services of Anwesha Clinic/Adolescent Friendly Health Clinic in Barrackpore II Community Development Block.

Methods:

A community-based cross-sectional study was conducted from January to March 2025 among 50 Accredited Social Health Activists (ASHAs) and 250 adolescent girls selected through systematic random sampling. Data collection involved supportive supervision checklists, observation, and face-to-face interviews. Quantitative data were analysed using Jamovi software, employing descriptive and inferential statistics including Chi-square tests.

Results:

Only 52% of adolescent girls were aware of the Menstrual Hygiene Scheme (MHS), primarily through ASHAs. Availability of sanitary napkins was reported in 84% of sub-centres, though irregular supply and incentive-related issues for ASHAs were noted. A significant association was observed between educational status and MHS awareness (p=0.04), and between dedicated space availability and satisfactory MHS implementation (p=0.002). At the AFHCs, 90% of adolescent clients expressed satisfaction with services, though gaps were identified in counselling services.

Conclusion:

The study highlights gaps in awareness, inefficient plans and supply chain mechanisms affecting MHS and AFHC performance. Strengthening the plans, ensuring uninterrupted supply chains, and enhancing community engagement through ASHAs are critical for improving RKSK implementation. Periodic supportive supervision and robust monitoring are essential to achieve RKSK's objectives and sustainably improve adolescent health indicators.

TITLE: Beyond Google Diagnoses: A cross sectional study on Cyberchondriasis and Anxiety in college going students

Introduction:

Given the high availability of internet access and smartphone use among college students, health-seeking behaviours are changing rapidly with instant interpretation of symptoms and self-care; however, frequent unregulated online medical searches can lead to cyberchondriasis (health-related anxiety resulting from excessive symptom checking on the Internet).

Objectives:

To determine the prevalence of cyberchondriasis—using the CSS-12—among college students in Siliguri, to examine its association with generalized anxiety (GAD-7), and to identify key sociodemographic and behavioural factors that predict heightened cyberchondriasis.

Methodology:

A descriptive, cross-sectional survey was conducted from April to May 2025 among 220 undergraduate and postgraduate students in Siliguri. Data were collected using a pretested self- administered questionnaire consisting of (1) sociodemographics and internet usage patterns, (2) CSS-12, and (3) GAD-7. Ethical issues included written informed consent and ethical approval from the Institutional Ethics Committee. Data were analyzed using Jamovi: descriptive statistics described the sample; Pearson's correlation examined the relationship between CSS-12 and GAD-7; logistic regression determined independent predictors of cyberchondria (p < 0.05).

Results:

Cyberchondriasis was noted in 25.9% of students. There was a moderate positive correlation between CSS-12 and GAD-7 scores (r = 0.362, p < 0.001). Generalized anxiety was the strongest predictor: mild anxiety (AOR 2.71, 95% CI: 1.06–6.89), moderate anxiety (AOR 7.27), and severe anxiety (AOR 4.89) were associated with higher odds of cyberchondria. No significant associations were found for age, gender, course or internet access.

Conclusion:

These results highlight the importance of college-based mental health screening, as well as monitoring excessive online health-seeking behaviour, with collaboration between colleges. Collaboration between educational institutions and public health authorities might result in leading to specific curriculum on digital literacy.

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


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
