#### Heritage of IPGME&R and SSKM Hospital

Way back in 1707, the first hospital in Calcutta, and the first one built in British India by the East India Company, was built on the premises of the Old Fort at Gerstein Place. The Council of Fort William constructed this hospital in a single building that measured 175 ft in length and 60 ft in width. This hospital, initially meant for the Europeans, was called Presidency Hospital.

Later, in 1768, two plots were purchased on Lower Circular Road for constructing a full-fledged hospital. Located near the Presidency Jail, the hospital came to be known as Presidency General Hospital, popularly the PG Hospital. The original hospital building underwent many alterations, including the addition of two new buildings in 1795. It was finally dismantled, and, in its place, a huge main hospital building was inaugurated in 1901.

PG hospital was initially meant exclusively for Europeans. This racial segregation ended when the celebrated Bengali poet Michael Madhusudan Dutta got admitted on Jun 22, 1873. After his death, 7 days later, the doors of the hospital were opened for Indians.

It was in the Presidency General Hospital in 1898 that Surgeon Major (later Sir) Ronald Ross, of the Indian Medical Service, identified the mosquito as the vector of malaria, paving the way for control of this major public health problem. Ross worked tirelessly for a few years accompanied by his Indian assistants.

The original laboratory where Ross worked still exists and has been converted into the Sir Ronald Ross Memorial Malaria Clinic. After receiving the first Nobel Prize in Physiology & Medicine in 1901, Ross visited his institute again and a poignant memorial plaque was installed in his honor.

After independence, the hospital was renamed as the Seth Sukhlal Karnani Memorial Hospital, in 1954, in honor of one of the doyens of the local Marwari community who donated generously for the much-needed expansion of the hospital. In official circles, people started referring to the Hospital as SSKM Hospital, although it continues to be PG hospital to the great majority of the people of Kolkata.

It was then a practice that Indian medical graduates used to go abroad for higher medical studies (post- graduation) and medical research. The Bengal Government, under the leadership of its visionary chief minister Dr. B. C. Roy, felt that this situation needed to be remedied. Thereafter, PG Hospital had the honor of becoming the first Post-Graduate Medical Institute in Eastern India in 1957. The college was given the formal name of Institute of Postgraduate Medical Education & Research (IPGME&R) with the mandate to impart post-graduate training in the clinical disciplines. The institute was inaugurated by Pandit Jawahar Lal Nehru, the first Prime Minister of India, on January 16, 1957. Since then, this day – January 16 – is celebrated every year as the Foundation Day of the institute.

The erstwhile University College of Medicine (UCM) was started by the University of Calcutta at about the same time, that is 1957, to impart post-graduate training in the pre- and para-clinical disciplines. On the initiative of luminaries of the time, the University subsequently accommodated UCM in a new building constructed at the north-west corner of the IPGME&R and SSKM Hospital campus. The building was named as the Dr. B. C. Roy Institute of Basic Medical Sciences and was formally inaugurated by renowned physicist Prof. Satyendranath Bose on April 10, 1967. The location helped foster a spirit of collaborative teaching and research among the two institutes. The inaugural year of this institute coincided with the 100th year of existence of the University of Calcutta. In 2003 this basic science institute was formally amalgamated with IPGME&R.

For long IPGME&R remained solely as a superspeciality referral hospital and postgraduate medical institute. Many milestones were added along the way, such as the first dedicated Respiratory Care Unit in eastern India and the first dedicated neurology teaching institute - the Bangur Institute of Neuroscience, the Institute of Cardiovascular Sciences, the School of Digestive & Liver Diseases and the Institute of Otorhinolaryngology. The Institute of Psychiatry (already existing as a mental hospital – Bhowanipore Mental Home - from pre-independence India) that existing alongside PG Hospital on Debendra Lal Khan Road and serving as the psychiatry unit became a Center of Excellence. IOP, as it is popularly known, houses, in addition to Psychiatry, departments of Clinical Psychology, Psychiatric Social Work and Psychiatric Nursing. The neonatology unit, initially a part of the pediatrics department, evolved into a separate full-fledged department, admitting superspeciality students, and becoming a model neonatal care unit for the entire country. The Physical Medicine & Rehabilitation (PMR) department is one of the busiest of its kind in the country. The Rheumatology department is the first of its kind in the state. For long after independence, there were few places in the country which offered graduate and postgraduate nursing courses. A nursing school already existed on campus. From 1974, a nursing college, dedicated to higher education in nursing started functioning, making it the first nursing college in eastern India to offer BSc and MSc in nursing. Towards the closing years of the millennium, efforts began to commence undergraduate (MBBS) training in the institute. These efforts finally bore fruit and the undergraduate section of IPGME&R was formally inaugurated on August 23, 2004, to start functioning with 100 MBBS seats. It has now expanded to 200 seats per year.

In 2007, the hospital celebrated its tercentenary and the institute it's Golden Jubilee. Today the integrated institute and hospital is expanding with the addition of new clinical sections and research laboratories. The nearby Sambhu Nath Pandit Hospital (Annex 2), the PG Polyclinic (Annex 3), Ramrikdas Harlalka Hospital (Annex 4), Khidderpore Maternity Home (Annex 5) and the Kolkata Police Hospital (Annex 6) have been added in the past 5 years or so. These amalgamations have provided much needed space for the hospital to shift sections to other premises so as to redistribute the ever-increasing patient load. The new 9-storeyed grand academic building that has come up opposite the renowned Woodburn Block has become the nerve Center of the institute's academic activity, housing the Director's office, the Dean's office, modern lecture theaters, examination halls, the Central Library and the Multidisciplinary

Research Unit. A new Cabin Block and Cancer Block are under construction, along with new hostel buildings for UG and PG students. New departments of Emergency Medicine, Infectious Diseases, Surgical Oncology and Head & Neck Surgery, have been added, all of which are the first among medical colleges in Bengal. A Sports Medicine set-up, again the first of its kind in eastern India, has come up as a multidisciplinary unit serving established and aspiring athletes and other sports persons.

Amid all this activity, the mission and vision of IPGME&R and SSKM Hospital remains unchanged, namely to:

- Serve as a referral hospital and institute for the whole of Bengal and Eastern India with many unique services.
- Impart basic medical training to qualified aspirants with the goal of producing competent, confident and ethical physicians responsive to the needs of the community and the country.
- Organize postgraduate teaching in different branches of medicine in an integrated manner.
- Impart training to qualified aspirants in the paramedical disciplines who can function to the highest standards in coordination with physicians to relieve discomfort and suffering.
- Arrange refresher courses for medical practitioners and for service personnel.
- Foster the spirit of research in fundamental and applied problems in medicine and train young graduates and postgraduates in the methodology of research.
- Encourage the development of different medical specialties in coordinated way and to offer facilities for practical and advanced training as specialized branches.

IPGME&R and SSKM Hospital is known all over the country today for its service and its undergraduate, postgraduate as well as superspeciality level medical courses. The state government declared it as a Center of Excellence in Medical Education & Research in 2021 and it is repeatedly ranked in the Indian NIRF rankings as among the top medical institutes in the country. It offers the maximum number of postgraduate and postdoctoral courses, with proportionately the maximum number of students in these categories, in eastern India, and is also one of the largest medical teaching institutions in India. The students and faculty of the institute continue to be its most valued resource and uphold the tradition of learning, service and research worthy of its premier status.

### **Community Medicine Practices: An Introspection**

As a community Medicine teacher, one question always haunts me- is community medicine a subject of cognitive domain only? Or rather, it should have a wider and multifaceted applicability? In a medical college setting, medicine specialists apply their skill in ward & OPD; surgeons in operation theatres; teachers of pathology, biochemistry & microbiology use their laboratories, and, so on. But where community medicine persons will apply their skill and facilitate to develop students' skill?

When we were given opportunity in data collection for an epidemiological survey, we felt happy, but at the same time, question peeped in my mind, was it the role of a qualified teacher? This could easily be done by a non-medical person with some training, or by a MBBS doctor. But when we were the part of the investigation team, starting from protocol designing, data collection, analysis, report writing to publication, then it was really a great learning experience. In another incident, when we were given opportunity to investigate deaths due to fever in a block, we were really excited.

Once, We had the opportunity, like many others, to get involved as master trainer in IMNCI, and evaluate its field application in different districts. It gave us enough scope to exhibit our knowledge & skill in live situation. But problem lies in its wider variability among teachers, colleges & chances they receive. Currently, clinical practice of community medicine experts widely varies from college to college. One common area is the immunization clinic which is run under direct control of community medicine department, and which gives opportunity to provide not only immunization services, but health check-up, growth monitoring & feeding counseling etc. It is found that some college authorities utilize services of communicable diseases clinic, general screening outpatient department (OPD), fever clinic etc. Here, thirst for clinical practices of our friends might be met to some extent, but that is far from concept of the subject proper.

So, which is our universal application area, should every college & every faculty have equal opportunity to practice their skill and orient students, both UG & PG in community medicine in true sense? Likely answer is the rural & urban health training Centre. But ground reality is this, apart from few, most of the training centers are not owned by the medical colleges. We become guest there, rather than host in these settings.

Bhore Committee in 1946 first recommended training need of 'Basic Doctors' who will provide basic clinical care and, at the same time, will set priority & identify solution to common health issues in the community. Department of Preventive & Social Medicine (PSM) in Medical College came into existence providing facility in field practice area where interaction of determinants of health could be studied. Though, in most of the colleges, subject of PSM was taught mostly theoretically giving least exposure to skill development and community orientation. Through a debate among experts of the subject in the platform of IAPSM, the subject was renamed as community medicine. In Community Medicine, community health, rather than individual came into priority, Community need assessment to solve community problem got more attention. We know the difference between clinical approach & public health approach, community medicine came in between the two overlapping on either side.

Community Medicine is different from public health and Clinical medicine in the context that it gives opportunity to the subject specialist to make diagnosis and treatment in the community setting in association with disease prevention, health promotion, community need assessment, and providing leadership in health care team. In community medicine residency program, it is desired that students must acquire competency in health promotion, prevention, early diagnosis & treatment and rehabilitative services.

Medical Education in global & national context has evolved rapidly in last few years in conformity with changing community need, educational as well as technological advancement. Community medicine is not an exception. 2Gradually we are trying to adopt student-centered, outcome-based mode of medical education replacing the teacher-centered, content-based approach.

The new competency based medical education for undergraduate course curriculum started implementing from 2021-22 batches with objectives of covering all three domains of learning (cognitive, affective & psychomotor). Family adoption program has been included as a part of curriculum in community medicine. It begins from 1<sup>st</sup> phase and remains thorough the course with competencies being spread over in ascending manner. Competencies as suggested to be taught in different phases are collecting basic demographic profile of allotted families, organizing health check up to report basic health profile including treatment, maintaining communication & follow up along with environmental protection activities, conducting anthropometric measurement, clinical examination of all family members, necessary investigation, treatment, follow up, remedial measure, counselling, analysing health trajectory of the allotted families. All facts and findings are documented in a log book. The whole activities are conducted under guidance of a mentor faculty. Thus, Family Adoption Program is truly designed to provide an experimental learning opportunity to Indian Medical graduate towards community-based health care. Non-availability of vehicle for movement of students, difficulty in incorporating time schedule of FAP in master routine, huge number of students in many medical colleges are different constraints as experienced while implementing this program properly.

In the recently launched District Residency Programme (DRP), National Medical Commission (NMC) advocates community-centric objectives in the 3-month mandatory training of postgraduate medical students within their residency tenure. PGTs of community medicine have ample scope to participate in implementation of national programs for their skill development, but in reality, are being utilized to provide emergency and OPD service to combat the manpower crisis at district level.

Involvement of community medicine experts in different skill-oriented areas is not an exception also. Their expertise was utilized as strategic planners; spheres of activities in covid pandemic; polio/ measles eradication; state or district level implementation of national programmes; or may be community level practitioners. But all these roles are very much individualistic, based on their individual attitude or opportunity or affinity itself. There is no long-term strategy on the part of central or state government to utilize the expertise, knowledge

or skill of community medicine experts. Also, the problem lies with our experts also. They prefer to join as teachers, without any involvement in community-based activities. Sometimes they demand or express their grievances why they are not given adequate importance in planning and implementation? But when they are given responsibility, not felt eager to participate on the ground of time constraints or huge work load of teaching.

Obviously, the question still arises what's next. What do we want? What is the expectation of government from us? These questions are still unanswered.

Breastfeeding Self-Efficacy and Its Association with Post-partum Depression and Breastfeeding Attitude among Early Post-partum Women in a Tertiary Level Hospital of Kolkata, West Bengal

#### Background

Depressive symptomatology and breastfeeding attitude has a tendency to affect breastfeeding self-efficacy, which is related with maternal confidence to breastfeed.

#### **Objectives**

To find out the association of Breastfeeding Self Efficacy with Breastfeeding Attitude and Postpartum Depression in early post-partum women in a Tertiary Level Hospital of Kolkata, West Bengal

#### Methods

The present Cross-Sectional study was conducted among 156 early post-partum women in a tertiary level hospital. Data were collected on Socio demographic and Obstetric profiles, Edinburgh Postnatal Depression Scale (EPDS) score, Breastfeeding Self-Efficacy Scale—Short Form (BSES-SF) score and The Iowa Infant Feeding Attitude Scale (IIFAS) scores by an interviewer administered schedule.

#### Results

The mean age of the participants was 24.24 $\pm$ 5.31, and the mean score they obtained from the BSES-SF was 64.90 $\pm$ 6.65. 15 (9.6%) of the early post-partum women were screened positive for post-partum depression in EDPS Scale. Statistically significant differences were detected between categories for Antenatal counselling for breastfeeding, EDPS Scale scores, IIFAS Scores for Positive attitude with respect to their BSES-SF scores (p < 0.05). No statistically significant differences were detected between categories for Negative Attitude with respect to their BSES-SF scores (p > 0.05).

#### Conclusion

With increasing level of post-partum depression of women, the level of breastfeeding selfefficacy decreases. The breastfeeding self-efficacy increases with increasing positive attitude for breastfeeding.

Validity of Finnish Diabetic Risk Score (FINDRISC) in Reference to Indian Diabetes Risk Score (IDRS) in Assessment of Risk of Developing Diabetes mellitus among Adult Patients Attending a Tertiary Care Hospital in Kolkata

#### **Background:**

Indian Diabetes Risk Score (IDRS) is a validated tool for Indian population a score  $\geq 60$  is considered high risk of diabetes and Finnish Diabetes Risk Score(FINDRISC), a tool recommended by International Diabetes Federation, a score  $\geq 15$  is considered high risk of diabetes. FINDRISC has a low sensitivity and high specificity in Indian population compared to IDRS.

#### **Objective:**

We aim to assess the appropriate cut-off for FINDRISC in reference to IDRS without compromising specificity of FINDRISC for assessing risk of developing diabetes among patients attending a tertiary care hospital in Kolkata.

#### **Methods:**

A cross-sectional study was conducted among 140 non-diabetic patients above 30 years of age attending General Medicine OPD at ESIC Medical College, Joka. A predesigned pretested interview schedule was administered to the study participants which incorporated IDRS and FINDRISC. Data was analysed using Stata 12.1. Correlation between IDRS and FINDRISC was assessed. Sensitivity and specificity of FINDRISC at cut-off  $\geq$ 15 in reference to IDRS and the validity of FINDRISC were assessed at different cut-off points of FINDRISC. The performance of FINDRISC in reference to IDRS was depicted using Receiver Operating Characteristic Curve(ROC).

#### **Results:**

140 participants were recruited in the study. Using IDRS (cut-off  $\geq$ 60), 51.4% had high risk of diabetes while using FINDRISC (cut-off  $\geq$ 15), only 7.9% of the study participants had high risk of diabetes. There was a significant positive correlation between IDRS and FINDRISC. The sensitivity and specificity of FINDRISC (cut-off  $\geq$ 15) in reference to IDRS was 12.5% and 97.1% respectively with PPV 81.8% and NPV 51.2%. At FINDRISC cut-off  $\geq$ 9, sensitivity was 81.9% and specificity was 72.1% with highest Youden index of 0.54 among all thresholds. In ROC showing performance of FINDRISC in reference to IDRS, the AUC was 0.81.

#### **Conclusion:**

FINDRISC performs better in reference to IDRS as a screening tool for assessing high risk of developing diabetes at a cut-off  $\geq$ 9 compared to cut-off  $\geq$ 15. Keywords: Diabetes risk, Diabetes Screening, Risk scores, IDRS, FINDRSIC

#### Utilization of Rashtriya Bal Swasthya Karyakram (RBSK) in a rural area of West Bengal:

#### A Mixed-Methods Study

#### Introduction:

Rashtriya Bal Swasthya Karyakram (RBSK) was launched in 2013, to reduce mortality and morbidity in children due to prevalent birth defects, diseases, deficiencies, and developmental delays. Mobile health teams (MHTs) and District early intervention centres (DEICs) are set up for screening, management, and referral of beneficiaries.

#### **Objectives:**

This study was conducted to estimate the proportion of beneficiaries who utilized the RBSK services, find out the reasons for non-utilization; identify the challenges faced by the caregivers and MHTs while availing the services and in implementation of RBSK respectively in a block of West Bengal.

#### **Methods:**

A cross-sectional study with explanatory sequential mixed-method approach was conducted in a block of West Bengal from May-July 2023. Caregivers of beneficiaries were interviewed telephonically about utilization, reasons for non-utilization and challenges they faced while availing the services. To explore the challenges in implementation of RBSK, In-depth interviews were held with the MHTs.

#### **Results:**

Out of 88 eligible beneficiaries, 76 were interviewed telephonically and among them utilization of services was 63.2%. Reasons for non-utilization were preference for private providers and denial of referral. Out-of-pocket expenditure (OOPE), long waiting periods and multiple visits were the challenges faced by caregivers. MHTs faced challenges like staff shortage, transport issues and lack of co-operation from Anganwadi centers and Schools.

#### **Conclusion:**

Nearly two-third of the beneficiaries utilized the services after referral. OOPE, long waiting periods, and multiple visits pose a challenge for utilization of the services. To boost the efficiency of MHTs, recruitment of ANMs and Pharmacists is advisable.

Evaluating the effectiveness of an educational intervention in improving the uptake of Single Dose Rifampicin (SDR) among contacts of Leprosy in the District of Bankura: A community-based pilot study

#### **Background:**

Administration of Post-exposure prophylaxis with Single-dose Rifampicin (PEP-SDR) can prevent leprosy among contacts. Objectives: To explore the barriers and facilitators for SDR uptake and to evaluate the effectiveness of educational intervention on the uptake of SDR among contacts of leprosy in Bankura District.

#### **Materials and Methods:**

A sequential exploratory mixed-method study with qualitative component as Focus group discussions among the contacts and in-depth interview of ASHAs and ANMs and quantitative as quasi-experimental pre-post design using educational intervention and control groups (usual care) among 84 contacts (each arm) was conducted in Bankura district from December2021-September2022. Thematic analysis was done to identify the barriers and facilitators. To see the effect of intervention, SDR uptake rate was compared in study and control blocks before and after intervention using Mc Nemar's test. Binary Logistic regression was done to determine the factors affecting SDR uptake.

#### **Results:**

Lack of knowledge regarding disease transmission, prevention, stigma, fear of adverse effects, improper counselling before drug administration were identified as barriers while faith on health workers, effective counselling prior to distribution, good rapport with health worker were identified as facilitators. SDR rate significantly increased in the study group after intervention (45.2%-94.1\%, p<0.001) Vs Control (35.7%-41.7\%, p=0.383). Educational intervention (aOR:41.22, 95%CI:11.7-145.6), household contacts (aOR:6.4, 95%CI:2.2-18.5) and effective counselling (aOR:4.2, 95%CI:1.6-11.1) showed increased SDR uptake compared to control, neighbourhood contacts and no counselling group.

#### **Conclusion:**

Educational intervention, effective counselling, type of contacts (household) along with addressing the barriers and facilitators can improve SDR uptake.

Effect of diabetes self-management education on self-efficacy and self-care behaviour among type 2 diabetes mellitus patients in a slum of Kolkata: a quasi-experimental study

#### Background

Self-care in diabetes mellitus is an evolutionary process of developing knowledge by learning to survive with complex nature of diabetes. Self-care behaviour in favourable direction was found to be positively correlated with good glycaemic control and improvement of Quality of Life. In resource-limited countries with increasing burden of diabetes, use of diabetes self-management education may play a significant role in reducing diabetes related complications and premature deaths. Self-efficacy, a Bandura's social cognitive theory, means the level of confidence a person needs to effectively perform a particular behaviour within his ability. To assess the effect of self-management education on self-efficacy and self-care activities, this phasic assessment will be performed which might be of help in determining appropriate selfcare management education guideline and its application frequency to ensure enduring selfcare management practices.

#### **MATERIALS AND METHODS**

A community-based pre, post design - quasi-experimental study will be conducted in a slum of Kolkata among type 2 Diabetes Mellitus patients of  $\geq 30$  years. Simple random sampling technique will be adopted to get estimated sample size of 157, calculated with 95% confidence level, 80% power, assumed proportion of patients with adequate self-management practices before and after intervention as 8% and 24%. Baseline data regarding self-efficacy and selfcare behaviour will be collected using Stanford Self-efficacy for diabetes scale and Summary of diabetes self-care activities assessment scale respectively. Follow up data will be collected at different post intervention phases following application of diabetes self-care management guideline and compared with baseline data using parametric/non-parametric statistical test

Comparative Assessment of Food Security and Hunger among the Vulnerable Rural and Urban Households of Darjeeling District, West Bengal

#### **Background:**

Food security is ensuring that all people at all times have both physical and economic access to basic food they need. Household-level food insecurity affects the whole. Food security assessment in India is a crucial and complex task.

#### **Objective:**

The present study is aimed to compare the level of food security at household level between the vulnerable rural and urban households of Darjeeling district, West Bengal and factors associated with it.

#### Methodology:

The study will be observational, analytical study with cross –sectional design done in Siliguri subdivision of Darjeeling district for 9 months. Sample size will be 220 in each group (rural- tea garden and urban- slum), two stage cluster sampling will be followed. Household food security assessment questionnaire adapted from Household Food Security Survey Module; Household Hunger Scale will be used for data collection along with sociodemographic data collection proforma. After obtaining Ethical clearance from the Institution Ethics Committee data will be collected by visiting households and conducting interviews of the respondent with help of pre tested pre designed schedule after obtaining informed consent. Collected data will be entered in Microsoft Excel after coding. Data will be organized and presented using the principles of descriptive statistics with help of tables and charts. P < 0.05 will be considered statistically significant. Statistical analysis will be done by IBM SPSS version 20.

#### **Expected outcome:**

Comparison of both urban and rural households will be done to have a better idea and identify the factors behind these.

### Navigating Adolescents in the Digital Age: A Mixed Method Exploration of Screen Time Behaviours among School Going Adolescents in a Rural Area of Hooghly District

#### Summary of the proposal:

Screen time usage has become a pervasive aspect of modern life, particularly among schoolgoing adolescents, profoundly impacting their academic and overall well-being. The excessive and uncontrolled consumption of digital devices has been associated with several adverse effects. As educators and parents grapple with this issue, striking a balance between the advantages of technology and its potential detriments becomes crucial to fostering healthy cognitive and emotional development in adolescents.

The study aims to assess the screen time patterns and behaviours among school going adolescents in a rural area of Hooghly district, the factors associated with it and the perspectives of the parents and teachers on screen time behaviours of the children, their awareness on its impact and their role in regulating screen time usage among the children.

The study will be conducted in two selected schools of the field practice area of AIIHPH, Kolkata selected by multi-stage sampling for a period of six months from October 2023 to July 2024 in a mixed method convergent parallel design. The quantitative component will be elicited from a sample size of 321 school going adolescents by a self-administered questionnaire and qualitative component will be extracted through FGDs among the parents and KIIs among the school teachers following the saturation principle. The data will be integrated at the time of analysis and an inference will be drawn on the screen time behaviours of the children and linkages with parental perspectives and teacher's viewpoint will be established.

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
